
Christmas program and Reception

Christmas break - NO SCHOOL

Dear Parents,

The Preschool has been bustling with activity recently. The span from Halloween to Grandparents Day, to Thanksgiving and now on to Christmas - it's all a blur. In my own life it has been the same - sports, musicals, pageants, and school work. I have a recent teenage daughter in my house and all that goes with it, which just adds to the chaos. My daughter has always wanted me to learn to French braid her hair and my attempts are always a disaster! And yet, we keep attempting the near impossible. Ella insists I can do it and is my consummate cheerleader, hair-holder, and brush-passer. On another crazy busy morning Ella asked me to try again, suggesting a different approach this time. We sit down, take a deep breath, work together and FINALLY attain success. And this isn't a slightly disheveled, crooked or uneven French braid - this is a semi-professional (at least from our perspective) French braid. With confidence, perseverance, teamwork, and determination we officially mastered the French braid!

I share this story with you because it reminds me what the children of St. Peter's leave our preschool with: confidence, perseverance, teamwork and determination. "Learning through play" is a term used in education and psychology to describe how a child can learn to make sense of the world around them. Through play children can develop social and cognitive skills, mature emotionally, and gain the self-confidence required to engage in new experiences and environments. Learning through play is the fundamental of St. Peter's preschool and how I personally raised my children. I see the benefits every day in how my children handle challenges, situations and daily life. adaptive, respectful, thoughtful, and compassionate - all with a quiet confidence. What started in preschool as a discussion on the best way to create a building - what materials to use, how tall to make it, who was responsible for what, and how to include everyone - has blossomed into how to navigate life as a teen or tween. Don't get me wrong, my children are far from perfect, but with the right tools they are able to solve problems and discuss how to avoid, or correct, mistakes. All of this we, as a family, owe to the basics of learning through play.



St. Peter's motto is "Children First," and we believe down to our very core that the way we approach early childhood education is the way that is best for our children. Preschool need not be a challenge; life is enough of a challenge for a child. Preschool, we believe, should be a place where a child can explore with great

freedom, nurtured by loving adults who understand that learning takes place through a child's whole body experience, not just his eyes and ears. That's what we provide at St. Peter's every day.

That being said, registration for the 2017-18 school year will open after the Christmas break. If families with preschool-aged children have moved into your neighborhood or your older child's school, please steer them our way. I know that this really goes without saying, because just as Ella has been my cheerleader, our families have always been St. Peter's biggest cheerleaders. We are a primarily word of mouth preschool and our families continue to sing our praises to anyone looking for a preschool.

I know that I say this often, but particularly at this time of year, I feel truly blessed to have such incredible families at St. Peter's. We are humbled that you entrust us with these precious little people every day, and we know that is no small thing. What a blessing it is for us to come to work and see these little faces every day and see the wonder with which they approach the world and everything they do in it

Christmas Program Notes

2-day, 3-day, and Pre-K children will be learning songs and so forth in our short December because on December 16th at 9:45am, you and yours are in for the cutest thing ever: our littles will put on a great program for everyone! Please do bring guests, as many as you wish.

That being said, here is what you need to know about our preschool holiday program: we put no pressure on children to perform. Period. Some schools do, and I am well aware that some parents like it this way – but we're St. Peter's, and while we encourage and cheerlead and urge, we will not require any child to sing, to "do the hands" or whatever motion accompanies the song, to smile, or even to participate. I spend a good bit of time reminding our children that the people in the audience on this big day will be their own loving families and friends, but (as anyone who has spoken or performed in front of an audience already knows) there's a huge difference between knowing that the audience is on your side and looking out at all those faces.

So please, do not be (a) embarrassed, (b) upset, or (c) anything but supportive of your child if he turns his back on the audience, if she stands like a statue instead of singing, if he comes out crying and just wants to sit on your lap and watch, if she yells the song at the top of her lungs. Just enjoy it: these are our children, at this time in their lives; it'll never be exactly like this again!

Dutreach in the Classroom

Books for The Clinic

Our Outreach at St. Peter's Preschool will be at the forefront of our thoughts in December. We have a project that has become a tradition for us, and we will continue it this year: we ask each family to bring in one inexpensive, new children's book to donate. We make wrapping paper for these books, mark the wrapping paper with the appropriate age of the child to which each book should be given, and bring the books to The Clinic in Phoenixville to be distributed to their youngest patients during the winter. Pre-K children are encouraged to do extra chores around the house to "earn" the book they are to donate, so start thinking about jobs you can give your young ones! (Matching socks, setting silverware on the table, folding napkins, or putting all toys away. Even entertaining a younger sibling for fifteen minutes so Mom or Dad can do something else.)

Registration for 2017-18 coming up...

Can you believe it? It's already that time again! Last year, many of you were just seeing St. Peter's (and we you) for the first time. Now we're getting ready for the 2017-18 school year!

In January, **registration** for the **2017-2018** school year begins! St. Peter's Preschool families have two weeks to themselves – from January 3– 18 to register before we open registration to all. Remember, that \$100 registration fee is non-refundable. We also offer a discount for second and subsequent children attending St. Peter's at the same time, and tuition assistance is usually available for those who need it. Tuition information will be available no later than our return to school in January, and earlier than that if I can get it together!

Even though I know that most of you are very familiar with our eligibility requirements and enrollment details for each program, but since we always have some questions, I thought I'd just put it out there again.

The details are as follows:

- 2 ½-year-olds' class Children aged between 30 (or so) and 36 months are eligible; toilet training is not required. Meeting on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 to 11:45, this is a lightweight introduction to the world of preschool; it follows a structure similar to that of our older children's programs, but has learning goals appropriate for the child who is not yet 3.
- 3-year-olds' class Children must be at least 3, and not yet 4, by Sept. 1 of the incoming school year. (Children in the Phoenixville Area School District have a different age requirement 3 by Sept. 30 because of their district's kindergarten age requirement.) This class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9 to 11:45. Developmentally appropriate learning goals emphasize socialization and lots of preschool skills.
- Pre-K class Children must be at least 4 by Sept. 1 of the incoming school year, with, again, Phoenixville ASD children's age cutoff being Sept. 30. The core program meets Monday through Thursday from 9 to 11:45. There's an optional Friday enrichment program for families who want to add a fifth day to their child's preschool week; our Pre-K teacher has carefully designed the curriculum of this optional day to complement the week's activities without compromising the completeness of the core program.

Pre-K children also learn in a rich hands-on environment with play as its foundation; their holistic development is its focus, just as in our younger children's programs. But lest parents worry that more "academics" will be necessary to prepare children for kindergarten, we stay in close contact with area kindergarten programs to ensure that we are teaching what children need to learn: not just academics (though they learn letters and their sounds, numbers and their uses, context and culture and science), but also collaboration, problem-solving, effective communication, empathy, and all the other building blocks of their future "big school" education.

**Summer camp registration will also open soon as well!

Advent & Christmas at St. Peter's Church – lots to do!

Regardless of whether you're a member of St. Peter's Church, or even an Episcopalian, there are many ways in which St. Peter's observes Advent and Christmas that your family may want to consider sharing with us!

- Dec. 18th, 10am Lessons & Carols: a quiet, candlelit service of music and readings that tell the story of Christmas from Creation to Bethlehem. All ages are welcome. The service will be followed by brunch.
- Dec. 24, 4pm Family Christmas Eve Mass:
 This is the big, noisy church service of Christmas at St. Peter's. Parish children act out the Christmas story. It's crazy, but both fun and full of Christmas carols!
- And of course for those who wish a quieter church service, St. Peter's celebrates Christmas Eve at 7:30pm (the Mass begins at 8, but you won't want to miss the music beforehand) and at 10:30pm (same story Mass at 11, but the music is beautiful) too. Christmas morning, there is just one service, at 11:00 in the historic Church.

And even if you are not moved to attend a church service here, do stop in to see the Church and Barn in their festive greens! The St. Peter's Flower Guild is "all hands on deck" in this joyous season, and their work, always astonishingly beautiful, is transcendent at Christmas.
